A new Wellness Program is underway at Albemarle Hospital to help improve the health of its em-

"The broad mission of this program is to create an environment that supports and promotes positive health and wellness practices It offers resources that enhance peoples' lifestyles," said Jim Stiles, Chairman of the Wellness Committee. Studies indicate that every dollar spent on a wellness program saves nearly two dollars in healthcare costs. According to Stiles, administrative staff is highly supportive of the effort.

Previously, the hospital provided an Employee Wellness Day. In January, the Wellness Committee decided to encourage employees to take part in activities throughout the year to improve their health.

The Wellness Committee is comprised of employees from various departments and it meets twice a month to plan employee health and fitness activities. 
