## Officials investigate as homicide

The Pasquotank County Sheriff's Department is investigating the possible homicide of a Perquimans County man which occurred on Old U.S. Highway 17, near the Pasquotank- Perquimans county line Sunday.

Russell Duane Matthews, 26, of Lot 15, Long View Es-

Sheriff Davis Sawyer said that Deputy Joe Ferrell received a telephone call regarding a possible shooting at 5:30 a.m. Sunday. Sawyer said after further investigation, it was determined that Matthews' wound was produced by a knife.

"Matthews worked for Mc-

tates, Hertford, was apparently stabbed to death in his pick and he had left to go home at truck early Sunday morning.

"His wife got concerned after 4:30 or 5 that he hadn't shown up after getting off from work. She called his brother who went out looking for him. His brother found him sitting in his pickup truck at the county line of Old (U.S.) 17 South. His brother took him to

Albemarle Hospital.'

Albemarle Hospital officials confirmed that Matthews was taken to the hospital in a private vehicle. He was pronounced dead upon his arrival.

Sawyer said the death is beinvestigated as homicide.

"We are investigating it that way until such time as it can be confirmed otherwise. We are also waiting on the autopsy report from the medical examiner in Greenville," Sawyer said.

### New handicapped placards now required

RALEIGH - The N.C. Division agency. of Motor Vehicles announced recently that it has started issuing new temporary and permanent handicapped parking placards to people with mobility impairment.

The new placards, required by state and federal law, replace existing placards. Old placards expired Jan. 1.

DMV Commissioner Robert F. Hodges said mobility-impaired motorists can obtain an applica-

New placard applications include impairment certification that must be completed by a physician, ophthalmologist, op-tometrist or the Division of Serv-ices for the Blind. Changes in state law more narrowly defined mobility impairment.

Permanent handicapped placards must be renewed every five years. The permanent placard is a blue two-sided placard tion from any state license plant that hangs from the inside rear-

view mirror when the vehicle is parked in a designated handicapped parking space.

Permanent placards, which cost \$5, must be removed from the mirror when the vehicle is in motion. Old placards issued on or after July 1, 1989, may be exchanged for new placards free of charge. However, a new certification from a physician is re-
