Applicants can help speed up claims

Disability claims usually take longer to process than other Social Security claims. But people who are applying for Social Security and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) disability benefits can help speed up the process.

We urge applicants to bring in any medical reports they may already have in their possession.

Normally, a considerable amount of information concerning a person's medical condition is needed in order for a proper Social Security decision to be made.

Quite often, a lot of time is spent contacting physicians, hospitals, clinics, and other treating sources for this documentation.

Valuable time can be saved if the applicant is able to bring in any medical reports he or she already has. It can really make a difference in how soon a decision is made.

And more importantly, it can make a difference in how quickly Social Security benefits will start if the person's claim is approved.

In addition to actual medical records, school records are very helpful in making decisions for children applying for SSI. Any correspondence that parent has received from the school which indicates the child's level of performance or behavioral problems is extremely helpful.

Such records can be report cards; individual education plans; and progress notes or letter from teachers, guidance counselors, and school psychol-

Recent statistics show that, in numerous cases, the medical records that were presented at the time of application were the only ones needed to make the proper disability decision.

In these instances, not only did the claimant receive notice of the decision much quicker, but taxpayer money was saved
