

State sets hunt dates, public hearings

North Carolina dove hunters not only will have a three-way split season for 1998-99 under dates approved by the N.C. Wildlife Resources Commission, but they again will have an early Canada goose season and a nine-day experimental teal season.

First segment of the dove season will be Sept. 5-Oct. 10. The second segment is Nov. 23-28 and the final segment opens on Dec. 19, closes Jan. 14, 1999. Shooting begins one-half hour before sunrise except for Sept. 5-11 when hunting begins at noon. Hunting days end in all segments at sundown.

The daily bag limit is 12, possession limit is 24. All hunters must have a valid

hunting license, Harvest Information Program (HIP) certification for dove hunting as well as all other migratory birds and shotguns must hold no more than three shells.

Canada goose season was set for Sept. 8-30 except in the northeastern counties of Bertie, Camden, Chowan, Hyde, Pasquotank, Perquimans, Tyrrell and Washington where it will be Sept. 1-20. There will be no open season in Currituck and Dare counties. The limit is three per day with a possession limit of six, and hunters must have state and federal migratory bird stamps in addition to a valid hunting license and HIP certification. Lead

shot cannot be used in waterfowl hunting.

King rails, clapper rails, Virginia rails, Sora rails and gallinule and moorhens seasons open Sept. 5 and run through Nov. 13. Woodcock season is Dec. 18 through Jan. 16, 1999, and the common snipe season is Nov. 14 through Feb. 28, 1999.

The experimental teal season will be Sept. 10-19 and it will be open in all portions of the state east of US 17. The bag limit is four birds per day. This season is under a three-year experimental program offered by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

Dates for other waterfowl seasons will be set at the

August meeting under guidelines set by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

Dates for public waterfowl meetings in each of the nine wildlife districts were approved for mid-August. They are: Aug. 17 - Marine Resources Aquarium, Manteo; Stanly County Courthouse, Albemarle, and Buncombe County Courthouse, Asheville; Aug. 18 - Craven County Courthouse, New Bern, Alamance County Courthouse, Graham, and Burke County Courthouse, Morganton; Aug. 19 - Nash County Courthouse, Nashville; Bladen County Courthouse, Elizabethtown, and Yadkin County Courthouse, Yadkinville.

COA looks for new leader

Stubbins on search committee

The search for a new president for College of the Albemarle is underway and staff and faculty from the college and members of the community from COA's seven-county service area will be heavily involved.

COA's Board of Trustees formed a Presidential Search Committee to be chaired by COA trustee Jan Riley.

Other search committee members include: Rev. Charles Foster, COA Board of Trustees; Kay Barefoot, Coordinator, Curriculum Instruction and Assistant Professor, Business, Dare County Campus; Althea Riddick, Instructor and program Coordinator, Office Systems Technology; Lynne Bunch, Vice President, College Advancement; Rhonda Trotman, COA student and president of Phi Theta Kappa honor society; Frank W. Hollowell; Nancy M. Ferebee, former trustee from Camden County; Harry Lee Winslow, County Commissioner; Bill Richardson, Currituck County Manager; the Honorable Jerry R. Tillett, Superior Court Judge, First Judicial District,

Dare County; James W. Smith, Gates County Commissioner; Evelyn B. Stubbins, Perquimans County Commissioner; and Pasty R. McGee, Pasquotank County Commissioner.

"The search committee is very inclusive," Riley said. "Faculty, staff, and representatives from all of COA's seven-county service area are included. The search will be a very open and inclusive process."

A preliminary timetable has been set for the search. Advertisements for the position will begin to run across the state and nation in early September. Submissions for the position will close in early October.

By mid-October, Gold Hill Associates, led by Dr. Bob Barringer, a former president of COA, will review the applications and recommend semifinalists to the search committee.

Later in the fall, the Presidential Search Committee will send the names of three to seven candidates to the State Board of Community Colleges and will schedule campus visits for the semifinalists.

COA's Board of Trustees plan to submit a final candidate for approval to the State Board of Community Colleges by January 1999.

Labor law posters available to businesses at no charge

Businesses seeking labor law posters should call a toll-free number to order the publications at no charge and avoid paying private companies for the information, North Carolina Labor Commissioner Harry Payne said today.

Payne urged businesses to call 1-800-LABOR-NC. The posters, which contain updated information, will be mailed at no charge. Poster information can also be viewed on the Department of Labor web site at <http://www.dol.state.nc.us/DOL/>.

Posters combine labor law posting requirements under state occupational safety and health laws, wage and hour laws and employment security laws. Employers are required to display the posters in their businesses where workers can

see them.

While employers are required to display the labor law posters, they are not required to purchase them. Some companies have sent notices out to employers, seeking to sell the information. One advertisement last year asked \$19.95 per poster. The ads often maintain that paying for the poster is better than the maximum fine for not having the poster displayed.

State safety and health inspectors supply employers with the posters during the course of an inspection.

Other available materials which can be ordered include a labor law booklet, guides containing occupational safety and health requirements for specific industries, and a book and videotape lending library of safety training materials. To order the posters, call 1-800-LABOR-NC.
