Instruction allows a student with MRSA to attend school regularly as long as the wound is covered, and the student is receiving proper treatment and has been released by the doctor to attend classes.

Stallings also reminded parents that the best way to prevent transmitting viruses is using good personal hygiene such as washing hands, washing cuts or

contact with other people's wounds or bandages is another way to help stop the spread of MRSA as well as avoiding sharing personal items such as towels.

MRSA has been found in schools across the nation and state, as well as locally in Currituck, Pasquotank and Gates counties. It has also been found in Elizabeth City State University. In other states, deaths from MRSA have occurred.

PCHS media center reopens

The media center that was damaged during a fire Perquimans County High School two weeks ago reopened to students on Monday.

Brenda Lassiter, public information officer for the school system, said volunteers from other school districts and from the community helped school personnel move back into the repaired facility Thursday with final touches to the center completed on Friday.

'The center has been repaired to a state which is safe and conducive to learning for our students, with limited spending because the final phase of the ongoing construction project is to remodel the existing media center for office administration," Lassiter stated. "Consequently, this was kept in mind as the media center was repaired. One such example is that ceiling tiles were not replaced. Although, aesthetically, this is not very pleasing, there is no safety issue or concern.'

Fire broke out early in the morning of Oct. 21 on the roof of the high school building that houses the media center, computer labs, a distance-learning classroom, and administrative offices. A Hertford police officer on routine patrol first spotted the fire and sounded the alarm. School personnel and volunteer firefighters responded quickly and kept the blaze from spreading. Fire damage was contained to the roof area, but the interior of the building sustained smoke and water

Others suggested moving the monument honoring Dr. John Harris, which sat on the courthouse green, to his gravesite in Cedar Wood Cemetery. County commissioners agreed the veterans monument should be located on the courthouse green, and replaced the Harris monument with the monument honoring veterans.

Winfall seeks grant

Funds would facilitate infrastructure for proposed subdivision

The town of Winfall is applying for a \$250,000 grant to help pay for infrastructure needed for the development of the proposed Winfall Landing housing project planned on property near Winfall Landing Park.

Members of Winfall town council are holding public hearings outlining the grant application process necessary to obtain a North Carolina Small Community Development Block grant under the North Carolina Department of Commerce Division of Community Assistance.

The 80-unit housing project, featuring both houses and town homes, has been in the planning stages for four or five years, Mayor Fred Yates said. Phase I of the project, designed for low to moderate-income families, will include 14 units that will sell in the \$125,000 range, he said.

One public hearing was held Oct. 29. A second public hearing will be held Nov. 12 at 6:30 p.m.

Deadline for the grant application is Dec. 15.

The developer for the housing project is John Harris Jr. with REAL Development, Inc.
