Filing period July 6-17 for the Nov. 3 elections

Four council seats, two in Hertford and two in Winfall, will be decided during municipal elections slated for Nov. 3.

According to Eula Mae Forbes, director of the Perquimans County Board of Election, the filing period for those running in the fall municipal election will open July 6 and close July 17.

So far, only one incumbent has said he will seek re-elec-
