### Former **Camp Cale** director found dead

Perquimans County Sheriff Eric Tilley learned Tuesday that the former director of Camp Cale Retreat, who was facing trial on six child sex charges, apparently committed suicide by carbon monoxide poisoning in Virginia Beach sometime Monday.

Margie Hobbs, police public information officer with the Virginia Beach Police Department, confirmed Tuesday morning that Stephen Carter was found dead in a vehicle in a wooded area in the 4800 block of Blackwater Road in Vírginia Beach around 10 p.m. Monday night.

The federal courthouse in Elizabeth City was named after Small earlier this year.

A life-long resident of Elizabeth City, Small is a graduate of the University of Virginia Engineering School and the University of North Carolina Law School at Chapel Hill.

He started practicing law in 1949.

Thirty years later, he was elected superior court judge for the First Judicial District and served as senior resident judge for 17 years.

Carter had served as director of the retreat since February 2002.
