## Design eyed for athletic complex

**Boards to discuss** hiring design firm

Board of Education members and county commissioners will hold a joint meeting next month to discuss hiring a design firm for the school system's proposed new athletic complex at Perquimans County High School.

A proposal submitted by Albemarle and Associates, LTD of Elizabeth City was ranked earlier this month at the top of a list of three firms that sought the job.



AA has indicated the firm will do the design work in 5-6 months for \$33,900.

"We have reviewed the projected scope for the project and the work required to develop a set of viable conceptual design documents for this endeavor, one that can be supported by the community," wrote James L. Overton, Sr., president of AA in a letter to board members.

"Our initial efforts will be directed and concentrated on achieving the highest and best utilization of the project site to fulfill the recreational requirements, provide conformity with governmental regulations, and to present cost-effective

According to the Dec. 13, ued while law enforcement 2006 edition of the Perquimans Weekly, Simpson was Amos said he has asked one of two men arrested during a traffic stop on U.S. Highway 17 by then police officer Jeff Thomas. Simpson, who at the time was in handling the evidence in from Elizabeth City, was driving a rental vehicle, and gave police a fictitious name and address when he was stopped.

Both Simpson and a passenger in the vehicle, Willie Garcia Warren, ran from police. Both men were

captured by Thomas and officer Kevin Worster, now a sergeant with the Hertford Police Department.

Prior to capturing Simpson, police saw him throw a bag into nearby bushes. Police later found the bag to contain 784 grams — more than three-quarters of a kilo — of cocaine. Police also confiscated nearly \$10,000 in cash from two men.
