Tilley: **Beware** of scams

Perquimans Sheriff Eric Tilley warns area residents of various scams that have impacted local residents, especially the elderly.

Tilley said elderly residents are receiving phone calls from someone claiming to be a family member asking for help and needing money. The caller uses trickery to first obtain a family member's 'name, such as a grandchild, and then uses that name to convince the elderly person on the other end to wire money to the scam artist.

"If you receive a call, check with your family first," Tilley urged. "If the caller says he is your grandson, hang up and call your grandson first to see if he really called you before you wire any money."

Tilley says the origin of such calls come from outside the country.

"There's just no recourse if the scam involves other countries," he added. Instead, Tilley encourages residents to simply hang the phone up if someone calls and tries to get you to send them money.

Another scam is fake lotteries or sweepstakes letters being sent to local residents through the mail, including a recent fake lottery letter from Madrid, Spain. Tilley encourages residents to look for red flags in such letters, like sentences that encourage you to keep the notification
