According to Hertford Police, Terica Yossed Lee, 25 of Hertford, was driving her 2007 Nissan on Edenton Road Street around 3:47 a.m. when three deer ran into the road from a field adjacent to Ballahack Road. Lee swerved to miss the deer, lost control of the vehicle, travelled off the road, down a driveway, and through an attached garage of an unoccupied house, police
