County in good shape

Despite a tough economy, Perquimans County remains in stable financial condition.

Monday night, county commissioners learned that the county's general fund balance of unassigned funds totaled \$3,088,081 for the fiscal year that ended June 30.

Auditor Donna Winborne of the firm Douglas A. Hollowell, P.C. said the county's general fund balance, which now includes tourism development as well as economic development funds, increased by \$21,478. The amount of unassigned general fund balance is 25 percent of general fund expenditures, well above the 8 percent minimum required by the state's Local Government Commission.

Winborne also said the county's water and solid waste budgets remain in good shape. The water fund ended with an increase of just over \$400,000 while the solid waste budget ended the fiscal year with an additional \$101,089.

Interim County Manager Frank Heath said county tax collections last year was up. The county's tax rate, which increased by 2 cents last year, also produced additional revenue.

Also Monday night, Ben Hobbs and Janice Cole were re-elected as chairman and vice-chairwoman of the board of commissioners for another year. The leadership duo was unanimously elected.

County's Tier 2 status unchanged

Perquimans County's Tier 2 designation will remain the same in 2012. Two other county designations in the region changed.

Chowan County's designation dropped from Tier 2 to 1 while Gates County's rose from Tier 1 to 2. Elsewhere in the region, Pasquotank and Currituck remained Tier 2 counties while Camden remained a



Tier 1 county.

According to the North Carolina Department of Commerce, the designations, which are mandated by state law, determine a variety of state funding opportunities to assist in economic development.

"Our goal is to encourage economic development statewide so all of our residents can find good jobs regardless of their location in our state," N.C. Commerce Secretary Keith Crisco said. "These tier rankings provide important tools that help attract
