Graduation rate soars higher

erquimans County saw a 5.3 percentage point increase in the graduation rate last year and a huge improvement for black students.

The 2012-13 rate for all students was 89 percent, compared to 83.7 percent the year before.

The rate for black students climbed from 79.5 percent to more than 95 percent. Statewide last year, just 77.5 percent of black students graduated within four years.
