"This year we have set a goal of 200 turkeys," Harrell said. "Open Door has purchased 132 turkeys but they need 332. So our goal is to complete their needs for the Thanksgiving distribution."

Smith said turkey prices have soared in the past

"Right now turkeys are selling at \$1.97 a pound. Normally they're 99 cents a pound. One of our volunteers has a son who works for a turkey grower and we checked with him and he confirmed they're just not blowing smoke. So we knew early on there was a shortage.

Shoppers can help out because grocery stores sell turkeys at a discount as a loss leader to draw customers in. Some will discount them if a shopper buys \$40 or so worth of other items.

"They (customers) can buy them cheaper than we can," Smith said.

Smith said. "We have some to the pantry. that provide sweet potatoes and other trimmings. But the Turkey Drop is unique.'

The food pantry has plenty of volunteers who can come in and sort and hand out the more than 300 meals on Nov. 23, the Monday before Thanksgiving.

"Last year we had about 40 people," Smith said. Some came in on Friday and others on Saturday and Sunday. Then there was a group that comes that Monout to clients who drive up said.

As it is, the food pantry spends between \$3,000 and \$5,000 a month buying food to keep the shelves stocked. Any added expense at Thanksgiving takes away from what is available for the other 51 weeks of the year.

"What I like about the Turkey Drop is it gets the entire community in-

volved," Smith said. In the end, she said, it's all about helping people.
