term projects, are estimated at \$683,873. The third category totals \$7.1 million and includes \$5 million for a new athletic complex at the high school. A donor has offered to give the schools the 34 acres across the street from the school if the school system raises the money to build the complex.

The biggest expense in the next five years is expanding Perquimans Central School. The budget includes \$1.8 million to build eight new classrooms. Two would be for Pre-K students, two for kindergarten and four for first through third graders. Central is also in the need of \$819,000 to replace heading and air equipment and improve lighting.

Perquimans County High School is in need of \$1.2 million to complete the to renovate the transportarenovation of the heating and air system in Buildings B,C and D. That figure also includes upgrading the ceiling and lighting. The school system also wants \$399,000

Perquimans County Middle School is in need of a \$353,960 retrofit of the ceiling and lighting plus \$91,200 to replace the gym floor and \$140,000 for six smaller projects.

Hertford Grammar needs \$161,604 for lighting retrofits in two buildings and \$174,000 for six smaller projects.

The projected needs for the period from 2022 to 2026 are smaller in comparison and total \$683,873. Replacing the roof at Perquimans Central will eat up \$504,000 of the total and replacing the roof on one building at Hertford Grammar is estimated to cost \$124,000.

There is also \$2.1 million for a new transportation facility and \$58,500 for three smaller projects.

come up with some priorities," said Susan Cox, the chairman of the school board. She noted some things that are this year's list were on the list that was compiled five years

Some things, like the expansion of Perquimans Central would only be required if the school system had the need. Enrollment has been increasing slightly over the past few years, especially among the youngest students, but that trend might not continue, Cox said.

Other things, like replacing the roof over the twostory part of Perquimans High, are "must do" items.' "It's leaking and it needs

to be fixed," Cox said.

The board has warranties on the other roofs in schools.

"The board will have to the school system, but not that one at the high school. Some of the other warranties are also nearing their expiration.

While the state as a rule doesn't fund school buildings, Stallings said DPI has from time to time been able to locate grants for some local needs.

But county dollars are critical, Stallings said. The school board's "fund balance" or reserve fund is down to \$300,000 and some of that is earmarked to continue the one-to-one computer initiative. A portion of the proceeds from the North Carolina Lottery is also set aside for local capital needs, but Perquimans drew down nearly all of what it had in the account to make security improvements at all four
