This request, exclusive of the regulatory fee, would result in the following kilowatt-hour ( kWh ) charges: 0.062 cents per kWh for residential customers; 0.060 cents per kWh for small general service and public authority customers; 0.054 cents per kWh for large general service customers. No DSM/EE rate rider would be applicable to rate schedules 6VP, NS, outdoor lighting and traffic lighting customers.
