At 31-years-old, Sam Barrow knows all about responsibility. But he wants more.



Barrow is a Captain in the North Carolina National Guard and has already deployed to Iraq, Afghanistan and Kosovo. He's also a father and husband.

The 2004 graduate of Edenton's John A. Holmes High School enlist-

ed in the National Guard when he was attending East Carolina University. After graduation with a degree in applied geography in 2008 he said he lucked out when Edenton Town Manager Anne-Marie Knighton trusted him to become the planner there almost five years ago. Under her, he said he learned a lot.

Now he's going to be a county planner

for Perquimans County.

County starts budget

Budget season has arrived. Between now and the middle of June, Perquimans County Commissioners will sit down with department heads and outside agencies and consider budget requests.

Ultimately County Manager Frank Heath expects to present a final budget to the county commission on June 5 and the commission is expected to hold a public hearing and vote on June 19.

The meetings kicked off this week when the commissioners met with department heads on Monday and Tues-

The new rule would require one teacher for every 18 kindergarten students, one teacher for every 16 first grade students, and more, schools would need
