# **Yates** retiring from

For the first time in more than a quarter-century, Fred Yates won't be an Elizabeth City State University trust-

Yates recently left the ECSU Board of Trustees after 24 years — nearly all of which he served consecutively — saying it's time for him to focus more on his other longtime job: mayor

Trustee appointments at ECSU are for four years and are renewable for a second four-year term. After eight years a trustee is required to leave the board but may be appointed to another term after one year.

Yates has taken that required year off and then gone back on the ECSU board three times. But he said he's not looking to return as an ECSU trustee this

"I think somebody else needs an opportunity to serve," he said.

Yates, who is mayor of Winfall in Perquimans County, said he needs to focus his energies on being the town's mayor on the next mayoral election in November.

"Winfall is basically where my heart is now," he said.

Yates said he has enjoyed his tenure on the ECSU

"I served with some good boards," he said.

Yates' service as an ECSU trustee spanned the tenures of six different chancellors:
