MANTEO - Prison inmate Mikel Brady could face the death penalty after a Dare County Superior Court jury found him guilty Monday of four counts of first-degree murder and other charges stemming from a failed escape attempt from Pasquotank Correctional Institution on Oct. 12, 2017. The sev-

en-woman. five-man jury took less than an hour to find Brady, 30, guilty on all 14 counts with which he

was charged, including the murder of two correctional officers, a sewing plant manager and a prison maintenance worker.

Jurors are expected to begin deliberations in the penalty phase of Brady's trial today. They will have only two options for his sentence: the death penalty or life in prison without parole.

Before they begin deliberating, however, they will hear from Brady himself. Brady's attorneys said
