Vaccinations Begin as Spread of COVID Continues

The first inoculations with the Pfizer COVID-19 are expected in Pitt County on Thursday, three days after the biggest vaccination campaign in U.S. history kicked off with health workers across the country rolling up their sleeves for shots to protect them and start beating back the pandemic.

Monday's vaccinations brought notes of optimism even as the nation's death toll hit 300,000, record numbers of people were hospitalized locally and statewide, and daily new cases averages were at 115 locally and 6,000 statewide in the seven days between Dec.

"I feel hopeful today. Relieved," critical care nurse Sandra Lindsay said after getting a shot in the arm at Long Island Jewish Medical Center in New York. "I feel like healing is coming.
