## **Commission Approves Annual Budget**

Perquimans County Commission approved its budget for 2021-22 that includes increases in property tax and water rates as well as solid waste fees for fiscal year

during Monday's meeting, commissioners adopted a budget seeks a 2-cent increase in property tax rates from 59 cents to 61 centers per \$100 dollars of value - the lowest tax rate in the region.

Water rates will increase from \$15 to \$17.50 (minimum bill) and from \$7 to \$9 per thousand after the first thousand gallons.

The proposed solid waste fee for FY 21-22 is \$150, a \$10 increase from last fiscal year.

The FY 2021-22 budget contains a 4% adjustment to the salary schedule based on information from the salary study performed by the Management and Personnel Services (MAPS) group last year.

#### 2 People Escape Boat Fire on Yeopim River

Perquimans crews also respond to brush fire, 2 wrecks

HERTFORD — Perquimans County police, fire and emergency personnel responded to a boat fire and several other emergencies within an hour's time on Wednes-

nications center was notified at 1:46 p.m. of a boat fire. Emergency crews were dispatched to a site at the end of Bethel Fishing Center Road, where they spotted an offshore, anchored-vessel burning in the Yeopim River. The vessel's two

occupants had jumped overboard and were swimming to shore.

The Perquimans County Water Rescue Team got underway and extinguished the flames using buckets and fire extinguishers. What remained of the boat sank once the fire had burned to the hull's waterline.

One of the boat's occupants was transported by Perquimans County Emergency Medical Services to The series of incidents began the helicopter pad at Vidant Chowwhen the county's 911 commu- an Hospital in Edenton, and from there the patient was airlifted to a nearby trauma center. The second occupant was evaluated at scene and released at their request.
