Perquimans opposes possible district shift

Heath: Draft map removes county from 1st House District

HERTFORD — Perquimans officials and county residents are expressing concern about the prospect of Perquimans being removed

a draft redistricting map that removes the county from the 1st House District and moves it into a district with other counties to the south, including Carteret County.

Heath said he advised area legislators that the counties in the northeastern corner of the state have always worked closely together and that Perquimans has no history of from the 1st House District when working with, for example, Cartnew legislative districts are drawn. eret County. Perquimans County officials hope to meet soon with the owners of the Colored Union Soldiers monument to discuss its possible relocation to the county courthouse property.

Trying to get the monument moved from King Street to the courthouse is one of two recommendations a study group recently made. The group was tasked by county commissioners with coming up with recommendations about what the county should do about the Confederate monument on the courthouse green.

Some citizens have complained about the 'Confederate monument, saying it should be removed because it's a remanent of white supremacy and was erected at
