Easley said.

Some of those assisting Leary's tenced, Easley said. They include Johnny Earl Jordan, who was sentenced to six years; Fred Rudolph Robbins Jr., sentenced to 7½ years; and Alexander Leander Williams Jr., sentenced to 11 years.

As a result of the investigation, law enforcement seized numerous vehicles and properties that Easley says were used to conceal the profits of Leary's illegal activities. Investigators also recovered

Perquimans County Sheriff drug trafficking organization have Shelby White said Leary is believed to have provided drugs to individual drug dealers who were operating in Perquimans. White said said his office helped with the investigation, and added that nearly every county in the region had at least one officer who contributed to the probe.

Pasquotank Sheriff Tommy Wooten said Leary was also a supplier for drug sellers in Pasquotank. He said his office
