Perquimans saw 7th-highest growth in visitor spending

Visitors spent \$19.2M in 2021, 67% rise from 2020

A study commissioned by Visit North Carolina said that visitors spent \$19.2 million in Perquimans County in 2021, an increase of \$7.7 million from

2020. That 67-percent increase was the seventh-highest percentage increase in the

The same study shows She said many North that visitor spending in Pasquotank County in-

creased from \$56.4 million in 2020 to \$82.4 million in 2021, a increase of 46.5 percent. The \$26 million increase ranked Pasquotank 28th for the highest percentage increase in the state.

Visitors to Perquimans spent \$8.5 million on food and beverages and almost \$4 million on lodging.

Tourism Perguimans Director Stacey Layden attributed the increase to visitors wanting less hectic vacations that "bring them back to their roots.
