Candidates for county commissioner in the Nov. 8 general election have ideas about the challenges facing Perquimans County, and how best to meet those challenges.

Vying for three seats on the Perquimans board are unaffiliated candidate Tim Corprew, Democrats Quentin Jackson, Fondella Leigh and Keith Nowell, and Republicans Wallace Nelson and James Ward.

Leigh and Nelson are incumbent county commis-
