

Sabbath Meditations.

I. There are hindrances in coming to Christ for salvation. What are they? (1) One hindrance exists in a misunderstanding of the moral or spiritual condition which is needful for the acceptance of Christ's offer of salvation. Satan leads the sinner to think that Christ wants him to be good before he can come for salvation, whereas the truth is that Christ wants him to come just as he is. Christ offers himself to men as they are. Waiting to be better is no good—might as well wait for your broken watch to fix itself before you take it to the jeweler. Jesus says, "I came not to call the righteous but sinners to repentance."

(2) Is the want of sorrow for sin a hindrance? Do you say that you have no feeling of penitence for sin? Go read the story of Christ's sufferings at the cross and you can get it; there you will behold the Saviour dying for your sin. Read Isaiah 53rd chapter. What kind of a heart have you if you do not feel sorry when one voluntarily suffers for some wrong act of yours? See at the cross God's judgment against Christ as he took my place—your place—suffering death in our stead. See Paul to Romans, 5:6, 7, 8, and rest your case.

(3) Is it sensitiveness, pain, on account of your reverence from God, shame on account of the degradation of your character, real biting hunger for righteousness? These you cannot expect to have until you accept Christ. This spiritual deadness which can neither see nor feel as it ought is the serious element in our condition, and if we would rid ourselves of this by any means of our Saviour at all. If, then, anyone has been delaying to accept Christ because he supposes that some preliminary process must be passed through, he should recognize that this is a mistake. What Christ offers He offers freely, and on the spot, and to all. No preparation is required. The preparation for rescue is danger, and the preparation for salvation is sin. Are you a sinner? Then to you Christ offers Himself. He did not say, "Him that cometh unto me with sufficient earnestness, or with a satisfactory repentance, I will in no wise cast out;" He did not say, "Him that cometh with some fair prospect of being of use in My kingdom, I will in no wise cast out." He said simply and unconditionally, "Him that cometh unto Me I will in no wise cast out." It is His part to turn us into reliable and serviceable men.

II. Waiting for conversation: Because the new birth is the work of the Holy Spirit many think that they must wait for the Spirit to do His work. Ask, are you realer than God, your creator? When you say that you are waiting are you not also saying that God is delaying? (God says: "Behold, now is the accepted time." What do you say? Allow me to tell your business, your part in the supernatural experience of the new birth. It is this: Believe in God's ability to make you a new man, and use at once the divinely appointed means to that end. God will do the rest.

III. Counterfeit Christians, like counterfeit money, are a common snare. My advice to you is, think less of the spurious and get into closer contact with the genuine. To know the power of God in Christ to save, you must go to those who are saved, not those merely profess to be. Can't you detect the difference between natural and artificial flowers? The counterfeit argues the existence of the genuine.

You do not judge the efficiency of a drill sergeant by the slouching gait of the man who has indeed enrolled himself in a volunteer corps, but has never appeared at a single drill, and is shortly to have his name taken off the books. And remember that in the end there is no difference between making a wrong profession and making none at all. To be saved you must confess Christ before the world.

THE FINAL QUESTION.

What will you do? You can live a right life and you ought to do it. There is one, the purest, best and strongest that ever crossed this earth and He offers to you His supreme help and closest friendship. What can you think of yourself if you refuse it? No soul can lightly put aside such a question.

THE SUNDAY SCHOOL

LESSON XII, FIRST QUARTER, INTERNATIONAL SERIES, MARCH 25.

Text of the Lesson, Prov. xliii, 20-25—Memory Verse, 21—Golden Text, Prov. xliii, 22—Commentary Prepared by Rev. D. M. Stearns.

[Copyright, 1906, by American Press Association.] In this book of Scripture are principles to guide man's conduct on earth; God's wisdom for man's ignorance; Christ the wisdom of God as our supreme need. Our wisdom is to give Him our heart, then observe His ways (verse 20) and walk with Him in the way (John xvi, 6). Most people think that they have some wisdom, but their wisdom lies in the direction of making a living and getting rich if possible. In verse 4 we read, "Labor not to be rich; cease from thine own wisdom." In chapter viii, 18, Wisdom says, "Riches and honor are with me, durable riches and righteousness." Elsewhere we read, "In the way of righteousness is life, and in the pathway thereof there is no death." And again, "As righteousness tendeth to life, so he that pursueth evil pursueth it to his own death" (xlii, 28; xl, 19).

In contrast to wisdom and righteousness our lesson sets before us the fool and his folly and his end. The destiny of man is either eternal bliss or eternal torment. See Matt. xxv, 34, 41; Rev. xvi, 11; xv, 2, 3. God is not willing that any should perish and has provided at the cost of the sacrifice of His Son as the sinner's substitute a redemption for every penitent sinner. The devil, the great destroyer, seeks in many ways to blind people to the truth and to their best interests, and it is written of such, "The god of this world hath blinded the minds of them which believe not, lest the light of the glorious gospel of Christ, who is the image of God, should shine unto them" (II Cor. iv, 4). Among the wiles of the devil mentioned in this book by which he deludes the unwary are covetousness, riches, self indulgence, the wicked woman, wine and strong drink. Today might be danced the theater, the card table, the dance, optimum, etc. The heart is deceitful above all things and desperately wicked; the whole world lieth in the wicked one; that wicked one is the father of lies and a murderer (Jer. xvii, 9; I John v, 19; John viii, 44). Under such circumstances what hope can there be for poor man-fool? None but in Him who speaks in righteousness, mighty to save; whose arm alone can bring salvation (Isa. xliii, 1, 5).

Compare the woes of Isa. v, 11, 22; Hab. ii, 15, and consider also the woes of Matt. xxiii. From I Cor. vi, 9-11, we learn that there is no hope for the drunkard and hereafter for the drunkard unless by the grace of God he becomes one of those of whom it is written, "Such were some of you, but ye are washed." I have just read these two glorious testimonials from Wales: One convert, who had been a gambler and drunkard, with his bodily frame shattered by his life, gave testimony that since the day of his conversion he had been perfectly restored to his normal health. Another, who had not been sober one week end for thirty-five years, said he could not now smell alcoholic liquor without sickness, the revulsion was so great. Some of the sad Bible records of drunkards are found in Gen. ix, 20-25; I Sam. xvi, 28, 29; II Sam. xli, 13; I Kings xvi, 8-10; "Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners," and He is able to save to the uttermost.

There is an "at the last" and a hereafter, and "at the last" is the flesh shell of the flesh and corruption (Gal. vi, 8). Many a drunkard has a foretaste of the anger and serpent experience which perchance are given him that he may repent and escape the torment where the worm dieth not and the fire is not quenched. The whole difficulty is in the heart out of which proceed evil thoughts, murders, adulteries and fornications, thefts, false witness, blasphemies, and these come forth through the mouth and defile the man (Matt. xv, 18, 19). There must be a new heart, pure and clean, and this God gives freely to all who really desire it (Ps. li, 10; Ezek. xxxvi, 26). Jeremiah said, "Mine eye affecteth mine heart," and Job said, "Mine heart walked after mine eyes" (Lam. iii, 5); Job xxxi, 7. How necessary is the prayer, "Turn away mine eyes from beholding vanity, and quicken Thou me in Thy way" (Ps. cxli, 37). "Look not" is the word in our lesson, but the way not to look in a wrong direction is to be wholly occupied looking in a right one. The first word for the sinner unsaved is, "Look unto Me and be saved," then for the saved sinner, "Run with patience looking unto Jesus" (Isa. xlv, 22; Heb. xii, 1, 2). The word of God is also good, "Look on me and do likewise; as I do so shall ye do" (Judg. vii, 17). If Eve had not looked on the forbidden fruit and if Adam had not looked on the forbidden spoil, what a different story it would have been! (Gen. iii, 6; Job, vi, 21).

Woman represents the worst as well as the best in Scripture. The true church is the bride of Christ and is espoused as a chaste virgin to Christ, while the false church is compared to a harlot (Rev. xix and xvii and II Cor. xi, 2). If drunken with wine, we behold the evil, but if filled with the Spirit we shall see Jesus only (Eph. v, 18). Neither the midst of the sea nor the top of a mast suggests anything of safety, but rather the possibility of sudden departure out of this world, reminding us of David's words, "Truly as the Lord liveth and as thy soul liveth, there is but a step between me and death" (I Sam. xx, 3). Inasmuch, therefore, as our stay here is so uncertain, how unwise and even insane it is to continue a moment longer in rebellion against God.
