Immediately after the wedding the bride's parents entertained with a reception at their home. Later Mr. and Mrs. Cox left for a wedding trip to the eastern shore.

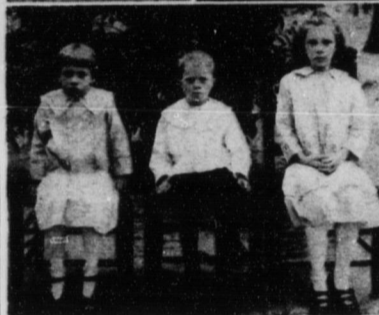
The bride is a graduate of St. Mary's Junior College in Raleigh. The bridegroom is a graduate of N. C. State College in Raleigh.

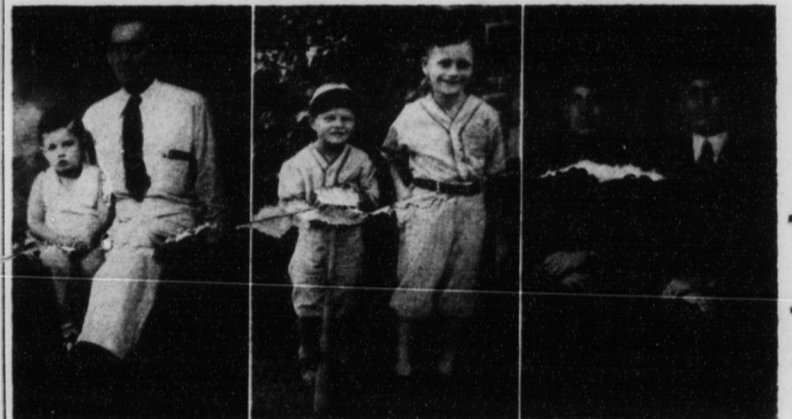
