NEW SOUND IN NEW NAVY

High Point -- "Long Island Sound", the U.S. Navy's newest innovation for modernizing this country's sea going military branch. Formed in 1972, the musical rock group's purpose then was to accompany two Navy patrol boats enroute from New York to Chicago. Because of that tour's great success, the Long Island Sound was made a permanent unit of the Third Naval District Band. Afterwards, the

band began touring the country and giving concerts throughout the country. As an example, the group toured high schools and colleges in Winston-Salem, Mt. Airy, Lexington, Greensboro, and High Point. Only last Saturday the nine-piece group gave a free concert at High Point College. The band's director, Warrant Officer John Geary, credits the success and audience acceptance to the band's professional quality. Officer Geary went on to say that the men in the group also dress as any other musical touring group, which also helps to erase any military stigma which could be attached to the group. "The fact that their hair styles and mod dress is now permitted by the navy transcends a complete attitude among the men in the group." "That too," he said, "Creates a different atmosphere when the men are performing." Geary

said, "When the Long Island Sound is playing, the audience soon forgets that the musicians are navy men, and that's what we're all about."

Geary stressed that the navy is now changing its appearance and thus becoming more attractive to today's young men. "This group, The Long Island Sound is only one example." When asked if it was now possible for a young aspiring musician to enter the navy to further his musical abilities, Geary quickly answered, "Of course, and that holds true for other fields as well. Fellows now come into the navy to develop their skills as well as learn a new trade or skill." "Yes," he said, "The navy is truly a

training ground for today's young people, cause you see, the same holds true for women as well."

Accompanying Geary at the time of the interview were, Vickie Ellison who happens to be a Black female recruiter for the state of North Carolina, a civilian, Terry Fassburg, Account Executive for Grey & Davis Inc., of New York, the coordinators for the group, and Chief Ted Rampp, recruiter in the Greensboro High Point area.

I asked Ms. Ellison how she became interested enough in the navy to join. Her answer was quick and desive. "Opportunities unlimited for the adventurous young woman." She also added that Blacks should begin taking a deeper look
