

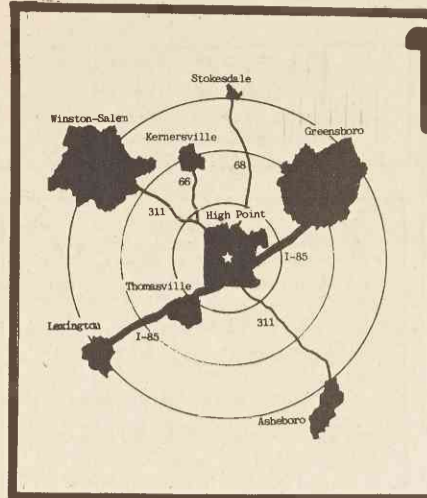

HIGH POINT - The Deep River Day Camp, formerly Camp Woccon, will be held in the High Point Municipal Park, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday, beginning June 17. The participants will be in the age group of Kindergarten through the 6th Grade.

WSSU Trustees Discuss Campus Growth Plans

WINSTON-SALEM - The Board of Trustees of Winston-Salem State University met recently in the Board Room of Blair Hall on the university campus to discuss plans for campus expansion.

The Board was presented with the proposed plans for the new Communications Building. Richard Messenger, chairman of the Building and Grounds Committee of the Trustee Board recommended that architects for the structure be Grant and Huberman Associates. The proposed Communications Bldg. is to be constructed at a cost of \$2,200,000.

The committee also recommended the construction of an additional fuel storage tank at a cost of \$60,000.

John P. Kennedy, Secretary of the University of North Carolina, gave the Board an up to date report on the roles of trustee boards under the new system of the University of North Carolina. Kennedy pointed out that many state systems of higher education are looking at the present structure of higher education as it exists in North Carolina. According to Kennedy the Board of Governors and the boards of trustees of each constituent institution play an integral part in the governing of higher education in North Carolina.

College Grads Of '74 Discovering Not Enough Jobs For Qualified

GREENSBORO - Thousands of 1974 college graduates throughout the Carolinas will soon be faced with the unenviable task of finding employment. Many of these graduates will be honor students while others, although they may not have been honor students more than qualify for the position which they are applying. But the simple fact is there just aren't enough jobs for the qualified.

One bright spot in the job scene is the number of jobs available for the technically trained student. This fact can be exemplified by the number of job offers made to the graduates of North Carolina A&T State University's Industrial Technology program. "Each one of our graduates has four to five job offers," said Andrew Williams, chairman of the university's industrial Technology program. "In a time like this our graduates still have the opportunity to choose where and who they are going to work for."

The university began its Industrial Technology degree program in 1967. Almost immediately such major companies as General Motors Truck and Motor Corporation, Bell Telephone Western Electric,

He has also represented his nation in the United Nations, Switzerland, Mexico, Ethiopia. He has been ambassador to the United States since July of 1972 and ambassador to Mexico since August of 1973.

The Heritage House, which was conceived by Dr. Dowdy and Mrs. Reed, is an outgrowth of the university's former Afro House.

The museum today has more than 500 artifacts representing the achievements of more than 21 African nations, New Guinea and Haiti. In addition to paintings and sculpture, the museum has outstanding collections of ceramics, masks, weapons, bracelets, coins, fabrics and cooking ware.

Dowdy said the university's goal is to establish a transcultural center to "learn about the differing but unique contributions to the national heritage."

Sylvania, Proctor and Gamble, and Ford Motor Company actively began to recruit the university's graduates.

"The growth potential in industrial technology is great," Williams said. "Many of our graduates land jobs with starting salaries ranging from \$10,500 to \$14,500 per year." "Ronald Robbins, a 1971 graduate, is now working with a company in Florida and is making in the neighborhood of \$21,000 per year." 1974 graduates of A&T who have accepted key positions include Reginald Booker, who will serve as a department manager for Proctor and Gamble; John L. Cain, will teach at Mitchell College in nearby Statesville; Alan Underwood will be employed by the Westinghouse Corp.; and Wake Wagner will be teaching at Forsythe Technical.

Minimum Wage Hiked

WASHINGTON - More than five million non-supervisory government employees came under the minimum wage law for the first time when the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA) amendments went into effect on May 1.

Assistant Secretary for Employment Standards Bernard E. DeLury said that the new amendments brought to over 8.5 million the total number of non-supervisory government employees covered by
