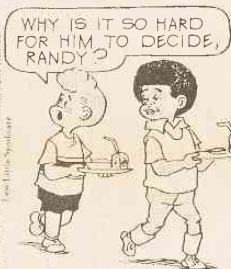

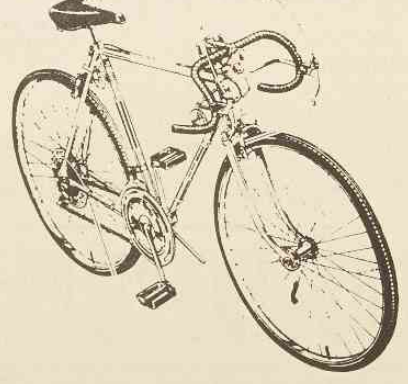

Dr. Kim Joins FSU Business Staff

FAYETTEVILLE -- Dr. Yong H. Kim, Assistant Professor of the Division of Business and Economics, has joined the faculty at Fayetteville State University.

The announcement was made by Dr. Charles "A" Lyons, Jr., Chancellor of the University.

Dr. Kim comes to Fayetteville State University from Alabama State University, Montgomery, Alabama, where he served as associate professor in the department of business.

Dr. Kim received his undergraduate training at the University of Minnesota, Minneapolis, and has done further study at Atlanta University, University of Tennessee, New York University, and Georgia State University.

He is a member of Delta Mu Delta; National Honorary Society in Business Administration; Pi Gamma Mu; National Honorary Society in Social Science; and was cited "professor of the year" -- Knoxville College April, 1969.

His membership in professional organization include the American Accounting Association, Alabama Association for Accounting Educators, and Licensed Public Accountant in Alabama.

Dr. Kim has also taught at Knoxville College and the University of Minnesota.

He is married and the father of four children.

Church Day Activity Center, Concord; Henderson County Sheltered Workshop Adult Day Activity Center, Hendersonville; Edgemont Senior Adult Activity Center, Tarboro; Activity for Adults (Creative Life Center), Winston-Salem; and Model Project for Adult Day Activity Center, High Point.

Effective October, 1974 through September 1975, the project awards are part of a Model Project Grant

from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW).

Criteria used to determine which organizations would receive the awards included: (1) Preparation of the community to utilize local funds to match the federal funds, local resources and a continuation plan for the project after September 30, 1975; (2) Innovation of the projected adult day care center and its comprehensiveness.

the day-long session in Merrick Hall. Jacobs said the purpose of the workshops are to provide up-to-date information on the College Board (CEEB) programs and services and to provide a forum for college and high school administrators to discuss current concerns.

CEEB sets the policy for the SAT (Scholastic Aptitude Test), which colleges use to help determine admissions.

Jacobs said the SAT is also being modified to include a test of standard written English.
