Julius Chambers To Head NAACP Legal Defense Funds

A Charlotte attorney and civil rights activist, has been named president of the NAACP Legal Defense and Educational Fund.

Julius Chambers will succeed William T. Coleman Jr., who is to become the secretary of transportation.

Chambers will continue living in Charlotte. He is a member of the law firm Chambers, Stein and Ferguson which he helped start in 1964.

Chambers said, "The organiza-

tion will continue with the same basic effort in court to challenge racial and discriminatory practices. There will be the same emphasis in schools, prison reform and other efforts."

Chambers is the first Southerner to be elected president of the organization. The defense fund, established by the NAACP in 1939, now is a completely separate organization with a national staff and headquarters in New York City.

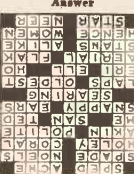

We have been toying with the idea of responding by sending a photograph of Walter Clinton Jackson, the Library, which will show that we are partially white and partially brick colored.

Chambers is a native of Mount Gilead in Montgomery County. He studied law at UNC and at Columbia University.

In that case, Swann vs the Charlotte-Mecklenburg Board of Education, the United States Supreme Court unanimously affirmed in 1971 the desegregation order of federal District Judge James B. McMillan, which led to the extensive cross-town busing of students.

Retired A&T Economics Teacher Pens Book On Philip Murray

GREENSBORO - A Greensboro resident, Dr. Juanita O. Tate, has just published a book on Phillip Murray, one of the nation's foremost labor leaders.

Dr. Tate's book, "The Forgotten Labor Leader and Long-Time Civil Rights Advocate: Phillip Murray," is a 202-page manuscript detailing the lengthy career of the late President of the United Steel Workers of America.

Dr. Tate organized and served as the first chairman of the Department of Economics in 1970.

In her book, Dr. Tate's thesis is that Phillip Murray was not only an outstanding labor leader, but a person who was deeply concerned with the welfare and rights of the workers, especially blacks, Mexican Americans and others.

"When I started doing the research for this book," said Dr. Tate, "I became startled by some of this man's actions." Here was a man who was interested in the proper treatment of black workers, even before the civil rights movement became fashionable.

1040 U.S. Individual Taxpayers Ask IRS

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q. Is it true that the IRS will figure my tax for me?

A. Yes, but you must meet certain qualifications. On Form 1040, your income must be \$20,000 or less on line 15 and be made up only of wages or salaries, and tips, dividends, interest, pensions and annuities. In addition, you must choose the standard deduction and file by the due date. Then the IRS will figure your tax for you. If you file Form 1040A, you may have the IRS compute your tax regardless of the amount of your income. The instructions for both forms explain what lines to fill out so the IRS can determine your tax from the proper tax table. You will then receive a refund for any

overpayment or a notification of the amount of tax due.

Q. When will I get my refund?

A. The IRS makes a special effort to send refunds back to taxpayers as quickly as possible. This normally takes from three to five weeks after the return is filed. Several factors can delay a refund, but you can avoid some of them. For example, be sure all the arithmetic on your return is correct, and make certain your Social Security number and your spouse's are right and that they are written in appropriate order in the blocks provided. Place the peel-off pre-addressed label from the forms package mailed to you on your return. Its use will

speed the processing of your return. Finally, remember that the IRS cannot send you your refund unless you sign your return.

Q. How do I report my dividend and interest income for 1974?

A. Schedule B, Dividend and Interest Income, has been reinstated for those who have such income to report in detail. If you have \$400 or less of dividend or interest income, you will not have to list it on Schedule B, but only include the totals on lines 10a, 10b and 10c of Form 1040.

Q. How can I correct the information on my W-2 Wage and Tax Statement for 1974?

A. If you receive an erroneous Form W-2, you should ask your employer to issue a new W-2 to you clearly marked "corrected copy." You should then file Copy B of the corrected statement with your Federal tax return.
