Named Athletic Director At Michigan University

YPSILANTI, Mich. - Dr. Albert E. Smith, a graduate and former athletic director at A&T State University, has been named athletic director of the 18,000-student body Eastern Michigan University here.

Smith's appointment was announced by University President James H. Brickley, after approval by the Board of Regents. He succeeds F.L. Ferzacca, who retired last July.

Smith, who will begin his new duties April 1, is only the second black in the nation to head the athletic program at a major predominately-white university.

"One of the things that stands out in Dr. Smith's career is that he has always shown fine qualities of leadership in performing difficult tasks," Brickley said of the incoming

ally appropriate today for our nation to emphasize logical economies. But the trouble with cheap education...is that we never stop paying for it." The NEA leader called upon the Ford Administration to commit resources "to eradicate the injustice and ravages of educational neglect."

Harris pointed to the injustice welfare rolls, unemployment costs, police forces, for juvenile crime, for vandalism, for keeping young people in jail." He noted that these costs to the public stem in no small part from the fact that nearly

one-fourth of all students drop out of school—some 11 million of them—and hundreds of thousands are suspended.

He explained to the President that nearly 1,000 men and women from across the nation spent the holiday weekend studying 16 faces of educational neglect. Among these areas were youth in detention, American Indian education, bilingual education, textbooks and curriculum, migrant education, safety in the schools, the education of women, and problems in the wake of school desegregation.

"Education must be committed to the concepts of the unique worth of the person and the universality of this experience," Harris told the President. "Education must be concerned with the creative development of individuals in multi-ethnic society. The educational enterprise must recognize and incorporate the humanity of all people."

Harris assured the Presi-

dent that the 1.6 million members of the NEA and its network of more than 9,000 local and state affiliates will continue to move forward aggressively on its educational neglect project. He added:

"We are dedicating ourselves to the vigorous search for solutions...and will pursue them in our statehouses, in our

How To Help Eliminate and Prevent Razor Bumps

Men shave in different ways because they have different beards and different types of hair:

A. STRAIGHT HAIR Grows from follicles that are straight all along their length.

B. WAVY HAIR Grows from follicles that are curved a little.
