Black Colleges Shortchanged Says Chambers

GREENSBORO - "The state of North Carolina is still operating an unequal education program as far as minorities are concerned," the president of the Legal Defense Fund for the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People said here.

Attorney Julius Chambers told an Honors Day convocation at A&T State University that recent events show that the state "has done nothing to improve the educational opportunities for predominantly-black colleges."

"We were committed to desegregation of higher education in the state," said Chambers, a member of the Board of Governors. "How can we say we are committed and in the same breath refuse an opportunity to locate the veterinary school at A&T?"

don't have the first black student there nor the first black faculty member."

"If the veterinary school had been located at A&T," said Chambers, "we would have had much better integration."

Chambers said "we have seen the inadequate funding of black colleges and I don't think we shall see that change."

He said blacks who advocate preserving an all-black college are laboring under an illusion.

"We must set a goal that be accomplished and that goal had best not be trying to preserve an all-black college," he said. "That A&T must remain with its tradition, doesn't mean that A&T must remain all black."

Special honors for him have been Doctor of Humane Letters, Morehouse College; Doctor of Laws; Wake Forest University, and Southern Illinois University, respectively; **Who's Who in America**; **Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities**; **Personalities of the South**; and the Freedom Foundation Award.

He is married to the former Edythe Williams. They have three sons - Kenneth, Ronald, and Norman.
