ing of Jimmy Rushing, the styles of the principal soloists -- Lester Young and Herschel Evans on tenor saxes, Earl Warren on alto sax, Buck Clayton and Harry Edison on trumpets, Dickie Wells and Benny Morton on trombone, playing arrangements created by Eddie Durham and several men in the band. "Head arrangements, developed spontaneously by Basie's soloists, added to the electrifying impact of the band. Through the forties, the band realized the occasional loss of key soloists, Basie, however, consistently maintained a band renowned for its contagious rhythmic pulsation, inspired soloists and superlative team spirit, a band unique

in Jazz. During these years the band featured a number of outstanding tenor sax men, including Don Byas, Buddy Tate, Lucky Thompson, Illinois Jacquet and Paul Consalves. Al Killian, Emmett Berry and Joe Newman were among the trumpet stars, the trombone section included Vic Deckenson and Jay Jay Johnson.

Except for the period in 1950-51 when he led a swinging sextet (the personnel included Clark Terry, Wendell Gray and Buddy DeFranco), Basie has led a big band continuously for two and a half decades. He has gained a global reputation for his undying allegiance to the beat. A measure of the esteem in which Count Basie is held

by 62 of his fellow musicians who voted his band the "Greatest Ever" and also "New Star" in the musicians poll in Leonard Feather's 1956 Encyclopedia Yearbook of Jazz.

In addition to winning American polls such as Down Beat Reader's Poll in 1955, Basie's band won the International Critics' Poll in Down Beat, 1956 and the Readers Poll of the French Monthly Le Jazz Hot.

Count Basie has definitely established himself as a modern music immortal during his more than twenty-five years as a bandleader.

Racist Jensen Blasted By Behavioral Scientist

GREENSBORO - The genetic theory of psychologist Arthur Jensen has created "a racist renaissance," a University of Illinois professor said in a speech at A&T State University last Tuesday night.

Speaking on "Race and Genetic Inferiority," Dr. Jerry Hirsch, a noted behavioral geneticist, said "like few other things, Jensenism demonstrates today why science without scholarship is bankrupt."

Jensen and Nobel Prize winning physicist, William B. Shockley, have gained national attention with their theory that American blacks are genetically inferior in intelligence to American whites.

"It is based on the fallacious assumption that teachability is the complement of, or varies inversely with, heritability -- a fallacy."

Hirsch's Greensboro appearance was sponsored by the North Carolina Fellows group at A&T.

He said the heritability measure was developed for a purpose and use "unrelated to and inappropriate for education and teaching."

"While Jensen's ignorance is unfortunate," added Hirsch, "his avowed goals are as heinously barbaric as were Hitler's and the anti-abolitionists'."

"It is perhaps impossible to exaggerate the importance of the Jensen disgrace," he said. "It has permeated both science, the universities, segments of the government and society."

Hirsch, an outspoken critic of both scientists, told his racially mixed audience that Jensen's theory is based on biological misinformation.

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
