

Most of the 950,000, plus, recent college graduates are facing a tighter job market than was probably expected. "A great number of firms seriously underestimated the force of the economic decline," said Frank S. Endicott, retired director of placement at Northwestern University.

Though the present job market is said to be improving, many of the 1975 college grads will find themselves competing with high school graduates for those few jobs that are available.




