Two years after the operation, Dr. Williams to the Chicago stockyards just to see his former patient.

Writing for the MEDI-CAL RECORD in 1851, Dr. Williams wrote that after a diligent search of records, he learned that the operation on Cornish was not only the first successful operation on the human heart but was also the first operation on that particular region on the human heart.
