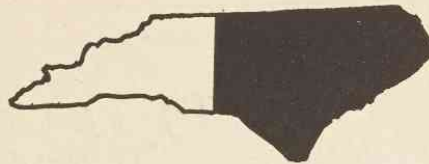

Reduced Bus Fairs Initiated

HIGH POINT—The City Council of High Point is pleased to announce the implementation of reduced bus fares for senior citizens and disabled and handicapped persons, effective May 31, 1976.

The reduced fare of 15 cent (half the regular) will be in effect Monday through Friday 9:00 AM - 3:00 PM and all day on Saturdays, beginning Monday, May 31, 1976.

Persons who are mentally or physically disabled, permanently or temporarily, who are under age 60, must apply for a special Furn-Tex Transit registration card.

Applications must be obtained beginning May 17, 1976 at any of the following locations: any neighborhood Recreation Center, all branches of the Public Library, City Hall Informa-

tion Desk and Community Development Office, most community services agencies, or at the Transit office (Senior citizens who do not have any other card may also pick up an application form at the same locations).

A&T Summer School Begins

GREENSBORO A two-week pre-session on May 17 initiated the annual summer school programs at A&T State University.

The two-week session, basically for undergraduate students, will end on May 28.

The other summer programs at A&T will include an eight-week session for undergraduates from June 1st to July 23rd; a six-week session for graduate students from June 14th to July 23rd; and a special session for recent high school graduates and high school juniors and seniors from June 14th to July 23.

In addition, special summer workshops will be offered in general forestry, industrial arts, African culture, environmental planning, and alcohol and drug education.

According to director, J. Niel Armstrong, the eight-week session for undergraduates will offer more than 150 courses.

Child Development Care Offered

GREENSBORO—Key figures in national and state child development programs are providing course content for the "Senior Seminar in Child Development" conducted by the Learning Institute of N.C.

The intensive five-day seminar, offering credit from N.C. A&T State Univ., began Monday with "A Status Report on Head Start and the Education Component," featuring James (Pat) Doyle, Child Development Specialist, office of Child Development (OCD), DHEW, Region IV, Atlanta, Georgia and Richard Rustay, Child Development Associate (CDA) consultant

for Region IV, Asheville, N.C. REGION IV COM—PRISES EIGHT SOUTH—EASTERN STATES, INCLUDING THE Carolinas. Tuesday's sessions feature Washington, D.C. representatives of professional associations and of the government. Dr. Judy Ramirez, OCD, DHEW, is the presenter of "Child Development Philosophy and its Influence on Head Start: Overview of Early Childhood Curriculum Models" in the 9-12 noon morning session.

(LINC LDP Director, Barbara Kamara served the N.C. affiliate of this organization in 1975 as president) Dr. Robert Bentley, National Council for Black Child Development, Washington, D.C. offers "The Bank Street Model" as the Wednesday morning session at the A&T State Univ. Child Development Laboratory. Dr. Bentley directs the Child Abuse Project for NCBCD. The afternoon Wednesday will be spent with Dr. Thelma Harms, curriculum director, Frank Porter Graham Child Development Center, Chapel Hill, N.C. Her subject, "Piaget-Based Programs," will explore the contributions of Jean Piaget, Swiss psychologist who theorizes that a child's cognitive and intellectual development proceeds sequentially.

Bennett Class Challenged

GREENSBORO "Never before in American history has a young black person had such a challenging opportunity to change the course of world history as you do today."

The 111 women graduates of Bennett College were challenged by Mrs. Glendora M. Putnam to take to heart the words of poet Robert Frost and have a "lovers quarrel with the world."

The deputy assistant secretary for fair housing and equal opportunities for the U.S. Office of Housing and Urban Development delivered the 1976 commencement address for the women's college. Bennett is celebrating its 50th anniversary as a college for women.

Mrs. Putnam, a 1945 graduate of Bennett, said their quarrel should help the world to overcome the underlying reasons for over population, health problems, junk food and the impersonal, uncaring attitudes of too many people.

She added, "Democracy has grown and endured, because in theory at least it has been devoted to the greatest good for the greatest number of its citizens. And in this day of instant communication, no government can endure permanently without some demonstrated caring for all of its citizens."

"Southern blacks are accustomed to their neighborly caring - sometimes it was necessary to their very survival. This nation must learn to care for its neighbors - really care for them - as black people have always cared for each other, sheltered each other, cheered each others' triumphs and mourned each others' failures as though it were their own."

Mrs. Putnam stated that racism and sexism are two diseases which have probably caused the waste of "more human resources than all the wars we have fought put together."

Mrs. Putnam, former assistant attorney general of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, urged the young women "to trust their collective powers toward the elimination of racism (and parenthetically sexism) wherever it exists and by any means necessary."
