American journalism has historically provided a place for the small newspaper which reports the activities of special interest groups in a city or other identifiable geographic area. This has been consistent with our nation's belief and commitment to freedom of speech and freedom of the press.

One of these special interest groups which has developed a thriving and progressive press is the 22 million Americans who make up the black community. This group is primari-ly responsible for the circula-tion of approximately 390 black oriented newspapers in the United States.

The black press employs about 2,500 people, publishes 385 weekly and five known daily newspapers, and has a circulation of over 10 million.

The black press began in the United States with the publica-tion of the Freedom's Journal, tion of the Freedom's Journal, by Dr. Nathaniel Tross, a first issue in New York City prominent black minister, in 1827. WASHINGTON - New income poverty guidelines for determining eligibility for al income poverty guidelines free and reduced price meals and free milk under the child nutrition programs of the U. S. Department of Agriculture were announced.

The new guidelines ch become effective which from July 1 to June 30 of next year, will apply to schools and institutions participating in the National School Lunch and Breakprogram, Child fast Care Food Program, Special Milk Program or receiving federally donated food. The guidelines are being issued in advance to assist school boards and administrators in


