

**RECIPES**

**Cooked Dressings.**

1-2 tablespoon salt  
1 teaspoon mustard  
2-3 tablespoon sugar  
Few grains cayenne  
2 tablespoons flour  
1 egg or 2 egg yolks, slightly beaten  
2 tablespoons butter  
3-4 cup milk  
1-4 cup vinegar  
Mix dry ingredients, add egg, butter, milk, and vinegar very slowly. Stir and cook over boiling water until mixture begins to thicken.

**Mayonnaise With Cooked Baste.**  
3-4 cup flour  
1-3 cup cold water and add—Make smooth paste  
1 cup boiling water (Stirring constantly. Cook until clear, stir until cool)  
Add 2 egg yolks and mix well  
Add 1 tablespoon salt  
2 tablespoons vinegar  
1-2 teaspoon dry mustard  
1-2 teaspoon paprika  
Add slowly; 2-3 cup oil—beating it constantly

**Molded Salads.**

Proportions of Gelatin to use.  
1-2 tablespoon to 1 cup unmolded  
1-2 tablespoons or 2 cups molded

**Perfection Salad.**

2 tablespoons gelatin  
1-2 cup cold water  
1-2 cup vinegar—if strong use 1-4 vinegar  
2 cups of boiling water  
1-2 cup of sugar  
1 teaspoon salt  
2 cups sliced celery  
1 cup shredded cabbage  
3 chopped pimientos

**General Rules.**

Soak gelatin in cold water until it is softened. Add the boiling water to the softened gelatin to dissolve. If gelatin must be softened quickly, pour the cold water over the gelatin and heat over boiling water until it is dissolved.

Add sugar to the mixture while it and stir until the sugar is dissolved.

Add the fruit juice, etc.  
1 tablespoon of granulated gelatin will stiffen about 1 pint of liquid. Do not use fresh pineapple juice in gelatin.

**Tomato Gelatin.**

1 can tomatoes  
2 tsp. granulated gelatin  
1-4 cup cold water  
2 tsp. salt  
1 piece bay leaf  
3 peppercorns  
1 tsp. sugar  
1 slice onion  
3 cloves

Soak the gelatin in cold water until soft. Simmer the tomatoes and seasonings 5 minutes for small recipe, 20 minutes for large recipe. Strain the hot liquid into the softened gelatin. Stir until gelatin is dissolved, mould and chill. Turn out on lettuce leaves and serve with salad dressing.

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Greensboro, N. Mr. Taylor demonstrated ways of shooting, guarding and passing, and really made the game look like child's play.

Motion pictures of various cage teams, ranging from mediocre college teams to the professional teams such as the Harlem Globe Trotters, were shown. Mr. Taylor explained the weaknesses of the various teams as the silent pictures were shown.
