## Dr. Banner Makes Forceful Talk At Bennett College

"We Do Not Live As Individuals," Says Dr. W. A. Banner

Using as his theme the words from the Biblical Prophet Isaiah, "Ye shall build up the old wastes and raise up the former desolations," Acting Dean W. A. Banner of Bennett College spoke at the vesper service of the college yesterday afternoon on the responsibilities of college graduates in their post-college life. He said, in part, that the following three things would be expected of them in whatever communities they chanced to find themselves after graduation: knowledge, a goodness that would not be self-righteousness, and sources of beauty for the inspiration of others. "We do not live as individuals," said Mr. Banner, who has taught philosophy and history at Bennett for four years. "Our obligations are social in character. And though we must think in universal terms—along the lines of what is best for humanity as a whole—the practical application of our thinking must be intensive, limited to the needs of the place where we find ourselves. However small that area may be, we will find the people we serve looking to us for a knowledge of the best that has been written or said in our particular field, a goodness that recognizes the full character of social responsibility, and an awareness of beauty that may serve as a source of inspiration."

Music for the vesper service was provided by Prof. Paul B. Oncley of Woman's College, who, accompanied by Mrs. Oncley, sang "It Is Enough" from Mendelssohn's Elijah, and "The Lord's Prayer" by Malotte. Bishop W. W. Peele of the Methodist Church, will speak at the vesper service of Bennett next Sunday.
