Etiquette SECOND MARRIAGE

The bride who has been married before usually chooses a simple, quiet wedding. Only members of both families and intimate friends are invited.

If a second marriage is in church, the bride usually wears an afternoon dress or a traveling suit. In either case she wears a hat. Sometimes she has one attendant, sometimes none.

Wedding Expenses.

If the bride has no parents, either she pays the wedding expenses or they are paid by some immediate member of her family. The groom and his family may be more able and very eager to assume the responsibility, but good form will not permit the bride to accept. Following are the expenses paid by the bride's family:

The bride's trousseau; Wedding dress, complete wardrobe—wearing apparel for morning, afternoon and evening.

Household Linens.

Wedding invitations, reception cards, announcements, including the cost of engraving, addressing and mailing.

Bouquets for maid of honor, bridesmaids and flower girls. Presents to maid of honor and bridesmaids. Church fee, decorations, music, awning, transportation to church and reception. All expenses for reception, wherever it takes place, at bride's home, hotel or club. This would include food, music, decorations, boxes of wedding cake and so forth.

Bridesmaids' Luncheon.

The bride often gives her attendants at a farewell luncheon. This usually takes place just before the wedding. It is not an elaborate party. More often it is a meeting for a final trying on of the gowns. The gifts are usually inexpensive jewelry, or something that may be worn at the wedding.

Guide Right Week At A. and T.

Greensboro. — The Alpha Nu Chapter of the Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity at A. and T. College celebrated Guide Right Week, April 19-26, with a series of interesting and important programs.

As principal speaker for the Guide Right Worship Hour held Wednesday morning, Rev. Kenneth K. Williams, pastor of the First Institutional Baptist Church and Chaplain of Winston-Salem Teachers College, Winston-Salem, N. C., declared, "The young person needs guidance more now than ever before in the history of the world."

Speaking on the subject "Dare You Face the Facts?" he said, "There are many boys and girls who go through school and don't prepare for anything. A. and T. Has First Blackout Experience

Greensboro.—A. and T. College experienced its first blackout period when air raid warnings played Greensboro and Guilford County into the semi-darkness of a moonlit night last Friday, April 24, at 9:15 p.m. The blackout maneuvers, on the campus and elsewhere, were termed highly successful.

The college campus was highly organized, and before the second signal for "lights out" was heard, A. and T. was completely blacked out. Prof. Warner Lawson, director of music, was air raid warden for the college. He was assisted by 31 faculty and staff members and a large number of students, who had charge of the blackout maneuvers, which lasted half an hour.

Parts of various buildings were designated as safety areas, and students moved quickly to those places when the mechanical bashees emitted their first varying wails. Blackout officials and guards went into action to preserve order and to secure efficiency of procedure. The period was experienced without the occurrence of any negative incidents.

When the "all clear" signal was given at 9:45 p.m., the campus resumed its normal activities. Pres. F. D. Blueford was highly pleased with the success of the trial.

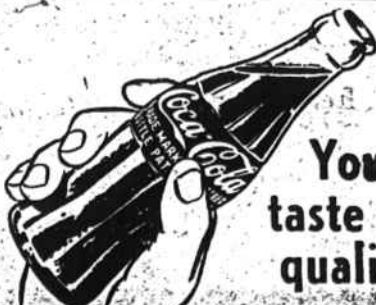
