GOVERNOR BROUGHTON WANTS PAY OF TEACHERS BOOSTED

Raise of \$3 a Month Suggested; May Ask Legislature for More

According to information from Ra-leigh, Governor Broughton has recded to the state school commission that the monthly pay of North Carolina, school teachers be increased \$8 a month and hinted another salary raise may be recom-mended to the general assembly. His recommendation was made in

a letter to Nathan Telton, executiva secretary of the commission, which meets in Raleigh to act on the salary ratas

Have Siren Warnings

Sirens will be removed from all imbulances, fire trucks and other vehicles in Greensboro shortly so that only siren sounds in the city will be e of the new electric air raid warning system, according to a statement from Defense Co-ordinator Charles G. Yates.

Mr. Yates said that removal of si rens from all vehicles has been requested and recommended by the state defense office and that it will be done in Greensboro as soon as it be conveniently worked out.

He pointed out that such a move will greatly improve the efficiency of the air raid system in that it will abolish confusion in minds Greensboro citizens as to whether the sirens sounding are those of an ambulance or those of the air faid warning system. The defense co-ordinator sent a let-ter. to Fire Chief Frank Shaw requesting that three minute tests on the alarm system be given at 12 o'clock noon effective last Saturday, August 15, and continuing each Saturday soll further notice.
