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## Charles Robinson Is Dead

Charles Dowd Robinson was born to the late Randall and Clarissey Robinson near Mount Gilead, North Carolina, located in Montgomery county, October 17, 1875. He was the oldest of four children.

He was the last member of the first graduating class of A. and T. College. After finishing in 1900, he taught at the college. While there he was summoned to Tuskegee Normal and Industrial Institute, where he served as teacher and traveling photographer for Booker T. Washington.

While a student at A. and T. college he met Carrie Lee Brown (deceased) in Jonesboro, North Carolina, whom he married in 1909. They lived in Greensboro for a few years and then went to Tuskegee. Born to them were nine children; namely: Charles Henry, Jr., (deceased), Carrie Eustace, Clara Gladys, Minnie Elizabeth, Helen Orella, Beatrice (Continued On Page Seven)

## Negro Soldiers From Fort Bragg To Be Entertained

### Dance To Be Given At Community Center

According to announcement made today by Harry Parker, Negro recreation director and co-ordinator of recreation for Negro service men in the city, First Sgt. Albert A. Banks will bring a contingent of Negro troops from Fort Bragg to the city for a day of recreation this Thursday. The occasion is the baseball game between the local Goshen Red Wings and the nine of the service detachment, quartermaster corps of Fort Bragg. The men will arrive by bus Thursday morning at 11 a. m. and will be guests of the Center during the day. The buses will report to the Windsor Community Center, headquarters for soldiers, and make the Center headquarters for the day. The Center's soldiers lounges will be open during the day for reading, writing and social hours. Necho pool will be open free of charge to the soldiers. After the baseball game at Memorial Stadium Thursday night, a dance will be held at the Center for the men. The public is invited to attend and help entertain the men.

Communication was received today by Parker from P. M. Binford, recreation representative of the Federal Security Agency in this area now stationed in the maneuver area at Wadesboro to the effect that the F. S. A. and the U. S. O. expresses appreciation and thanks to the people of Greensboro, for the "splendid manner in which the troops were entertained last week-end." Another convoy of Negro troops from the maneuver areas is expected to visit the city for another week-end of recreation in the near future.

## Navy Day To Be Celebrated At Windsor Center

### Navy Band From Chapel Hill Invited

According to announcement made today by Harry Parker, assistant director of recreation in charge of the Negro division of the local recreation commission, and co-ordinator of recreation for Negro service men in the city, Navy day will be celebrated at the Windsor Community Center at an early date in the near future not yet announced. Invitation has been extended, the Negro Navy band, the first of its kind, now stationed at the Navy's pre-flight training school at Chapel Hill, to be guests of the Windsor Center for a Navy prom to be held in honor of the men. The date of the celebration will be determined by the commanding officer of the Chapel Hill unit. A large portion of the Navy band is composed of local boys from the city and A. and T. college, the band drawing much of its talent from the Dudley High school and A. and T. College band units.

A detachment of Negro troops from Fort Bragg, will be the guests of the Windsor Center this Thursday for a day of recreation it was also announced today. They men will again be in charge of First Sgt. Albert A. Banks, of the service detachment, quartermaster corps, a unit which has been to the city several times. ## First Aid Unit Organized Here

### Red Cross Mobile Plan Is Authorized

Authority to organize a mobile first aid unit was received last week by local Red Cross chapter from area headquarters in Alexandria, Va., and six first aid instructors have enrolled.

Only first aid instructors who have cars, are in current good standing and have taught at least one class may register in this particular mobile unit. Those enrolled have been furnished with 16-unit kits, which they must carry in their cars at all times with metal markers attached to the car designating the driver as a qualified first aider. Covers are furnished so that the marker will not show if someone not qualified to give first aid drives the car. Report forms are also carried by the first aiders and all accidents in which they administer first aid must be noted on them.

Five of the six instructors enrolled comprise the entire county nursing staff. They include W. C. Stallings, Miss Mary Frances Kilgo, Miss Lucy Monroe, Mrs. Dorothy B. Jones and Miss Mary Elizabeth Griffin. Mrs. Clara G. Carlton, of Morrison-Neese Furniture company also is enrolled. It is expected that other instructors will join the unit which is the first of its kind in Greensboro.

## GOVERNOR BROUGHTON WANTS PAY OF TEACHERS BOOSTED

### Raise of \$3 a Month Suggested; May Ask Legislature for More

According to information from Raleigh, Governor Broughton has recommended to the state school commission that the monthly pay of North Carolina school teachers be increased \$3 a month and hinted another salary raise may be recommended to the general assembly.

His recommendation was made in a letter to Nathan Yelton, executive secretary of the commission, which meets in Raleigh to act on the salary raise.

Mr. Broughton pointed out that the school budget for the current fiscal year has an available surplus of \$600,000 and recommended that this fund be used to increase teacher pay.

The salaries of both white and Negro teachers would be boosted if the governor's recommendations are followed.

It is his opinion that this net surplus after all reasonable contingencies have been carefully provided for should be distributed to the public school teachers of the state on a per capita basis and that such a distribution should include both white and Negro teachers, the governor said.

## WILL REMOVE SIRENS FROM ALL VEHICLES

### Fire Trucks and Ambulances Not To Have Siren Warnings

Sirens will be removed from all ambulances, fire trucks and other vehicles in Greensboro shortly so that only siren sounds in the city will be those of the new electric air raid warning system, according to a statement from Defense Co-ordinator Charles G. Yates.

Mr. Yates said that removal of sirens from all vehicles has been requested and recommended by the state defense office and that it will be done in Greensboro as soon as it can be conveniently worked out.

He pointed out that such a move will greatly improve the efficiency of the air raid system in that it will abolish confusion in minds of Greensboro citizens as to whether the sirens sounding are those of an ambulance or those of the air raid warning system.

The defense co-ordinator sent a letter to Fire Chief Frank Shaw requesting that three minute tests on the alarm system be given at 12 o'clock noon effective last Saturday, August 15, and continuing each Saturday with further notice.

## Schools for Bus Drivers Will Be Held

The office of Supt. T. R. Foust, today sent notices to all principals of rural Guilford county schools to advise them of the annual schedule of schools for the bus drivers, which regular and substitute drivers are required to attend. A state highway patrolman will be at each school to issue certificates of proficiency.

Negro bus drivers will meet at the county garage on Battleground road Saturday, September 2, at 10 a. m. for their school.

The schedule of schools for white drivers, each to begin at 9 a. m. on the dates specified follows:

- August 24 at Rankin school for drivers from Bessemer, Guilford, Rankin, Madison, Monticello and Busck schools, August 25 at MeLeansville, Gibsonville, Whitsett and Alamance schools, August 26 at Jamestown school, for drivers from Jamestown, Union Hill, Sedgfield, Allen Jay and Oak View schools, August 27 at Pleasant Garden school for bus drivers from Pleasant Garden, Sumner and Nathaniel Greene schools, and August 28 at Summerfield school, for drivers from S. field, Stokedale, Oak Ridge, field and Colfax schools.
