The ceremony was performed by the Rev. H. C. Miller, pastor of St. James Presbyterian Church, here, who stood before a background of palms and peonies with seven branch candelabras.

Mrs. Kenney's only attendant was her sister, Miss Anne R. Wood of Boston, Massachusetts. Mr. Kenney had as his best man his brother, Howard Kenney of Tuskegee, Ala.

The bride was given in marriage by her uncle, Dr. C. R. Wood of Gary, Indiana. Little John B. McLaughlin, Jr., son of Dr. and Mrs. John B. McLaughlin was ring bearer.

Pre-nuptial music was played by Bernard L. Mason, violinist of A. and T. College, who was accompanied by Mrs. N. C. Webster. His numbers included: "Hymne A. Saint Cecile," "Liebesleid," "Adoration," "Meditation from Thais," and "Canzonetta."
