The beliefs of Henry Martin Tupper, sainted founder of Shaw University, in dignifying common daily tasks, never being a quitter, in the use of the weapon of prayer, and in the goodness of God were commended by Walliam C. Craver, executive secretary of the Houston, Texas YMCA, to more than five hundred Shaw University students, alumni, and friends in the main address delivered on the occasion of the 78th anniversary, of Shaw University in the Shaw University Greenleaf Memorial Hall, Friday, November 19, it was, according to members of the Shaw alumni who have attended founder's day celebrations during the past twenty years, one of the most significant Founder's Day celebrations in recent years.

The celebration was marked by the return of numerous prominent Shaw alumni who have made unusual contributions in their fields of service and by the donation of six thousand dollars received from these alumni and various baptist associations and conventions throughout the state of North Carolina.

In addition to the address of Mr. Carver, himself a prominent alumnus of Shaw University, the Founder's Day program included the annual Founder's Day greeting by President Robert P. Daniel; the "In Memoriam" prayer by the Rev. C. F. Pope, Raleigh; scripture reading by the Rev. Claude Trotter, pastor First Baptist Church, Graham; opening and closing prayer by the Rev. W. M. Wyatt of Salisbury; and Rev. G. E. Griffin, executive secretary, General Baptist State Convention of North- Carolina, respectively. Music on the program was furnished by the Shaw University choral society under the direction of Mrs. Emily M. Kelley.

Prior to the chapel program students, teachers, and alumni of the Raleigh institution surrounded the grave of Dr. Henry Martin Tupper to pay tribute to the founder in simple ceremony which included prayer by the Rev. A. A .Morisey, Raleigh, the singing of Dr. Tupper's favorite hymn, and "Taps" by Henry Clay Turner a student at Shaw University. A special wreath was placed on the grave by Miss Annie Hudgins a member of the student body.

Mr. Craver extolled the life of Dr. Tupper and explained how he set in motion "constructive forces for good in society, that have extended themselves not only throughout the South and the Nation but even to the islands of the sea and far away

Africa."
Insisting that the Atlantic charter and the four freedoms Craver painted Dr. Tupper as having faced in 1865 with resolutions and determination the same problems that confront the world today. 
