Friday was observed as hospital day in the Negro rural schools with first aid demonstrations and health talks as part of the program, while in each school donations were received to be used in replenishing the linen supply at L. Richardson Memorial hospital.

While reports from Woody and Brown Summit schools had not been received yesterday. Beatrice Coles, principal of Sedalia public school and chairman of arrangements, reported good response in cash and other donations.

The following reports from schools had been received : Climax, \$8.05; Florence, \$10.71; Gibsonville, \$10.65; Goshen, \$15; East White-Oak, \$7.82; Mt. Zion, \$5; Oak Springs, \$2; Oak Ridge, \$2; Jackson, \$6.17; Bass Chapel, \$1.50; Summerfield, \$5; Palmer Memorial institute, \$10,, and Sedalla public school, \$25.84. Shaw Univsity Receives Css A Rating

Shaw university, piering institution of higher cation in the south and one of first five Negro colleges in United States, has been assid a class A rating by the Asation of Colleges and Seconda Schools in Southern States arding to announcement of Prent Robert P. Daniel. Notificm of the rating was received by Raleigh school December 18 fwing the December 10 Chattana meeting of the association athich the action was taken.

President Robert Daniel's dministration at Sw is the ourth under which tstanding formal recognition ohe Shaw university course oftudy has been granted althoughhe work of the institution hasen recogrized by prominent lucational authorities and insitions of ligher education throhout the years. The school wapunded in 1865 and was incorposed March D. 1875 under the adnistration of Dr. Henry Martin ipper. The cass "A" rating was en by the North Carolina stateepartment o education April 9,923 when Dr. Joseph Leishman acock was president. Shaw unirsity was plaied on the approv list with a rating of "B" by thessociation of Colleges and Secondary Schols of Southern States in 1933 during the admistration of ex-President William euart Nel-

Upon receiving theannouncement Dt. Robert P. laniel declared that much of th credit for this most recent achiement at Shaw university is ae to the alumni and to churchsupporters who "have worked unlfishly to remove the financial ifficulties which have beset thislandmark of Negro education thrighout the years."

During the past sem years Shaw alumni, Baptist upporters of the school, and speal friends have contributed furs which made it possible for themiversity to complete a project (renovating six of the universit buildings at a cost of \$175,000. Dormitory facilities have been imroved and library facilities expaned to exceed the minimum regirements set by the Southern Asociation.

Dr. Daniel expresses he intention of continuing at haw the program of improvemet which will keep the historica Raleigh institution "in the frefront of education."
