## Shaw University Receives Class A Rating

Shaw university, premier institution of higher education in the south and one of first five Negro colleges in United States, has been assigned a class A rating by the Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools in Southern States pending announcement of Prent Robert P. Daniel. Notification of the rating was received by Raleigh school December 18 following the December 10 Chattanooga meeting of the association at which the action was taken.

President Robert Daniel's administration at Shaw is the fourth under which standing formal recognition of the Shaw university course of study has been granted although the work of the institution has been recognized by prominent educational authorities and institutions of higher education throughout the years. The school was founded in 1865 and was incorporated March 19, 1875 under the administration of Dr. Henry Martin Upper. The class "A" rating was given by the North Carolina state department of education April 9, 1923 when Dr. Joseph Leishman was president. Shaw university was placed on the approval list with a rating of "B" by the Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools of Southern States in 1933 during the administration of ex-President William Stuart Nelson.

It is implied by thirating that Shaw university graduates will continue to be receive highly rated graduate and professional schools throughout the country.

Upon receiving the announcement Dr. Robert P. Daniel declared that much of the credit for this most recent achievement at Shaw university is due to the alumni and church supporters who "have worked unflinchingly to remove the financial difficulties which have beset this landmark of Negro education throughout the years."

During the past several years Shaw alumni, Baptist supporters of the school, and special friends have contributed funds which made it possible for the university to complete a project of renovating six of the university buildings at a cost of \$175,000. Dormitory facilities have been improved and library facilities expanded to exceed the minimum requirements set by the Southern Association.

Dr. Daniel expresses his intention of continuing at Shaw the program of improvement which will keep the historical Raleigh institution "in the forefront of education."

### HOSPITAL DAY HELD IN NEGRO SCHOOLS

Friday was observed as hospital day in the Negro rural schools with first aid demonstrations and health talks as part of the program, while in each school donations were received to be used in replenishing the linen supply at L. Richardson Memorial hospital.

While reports from Woody and Brown Summit schools had not been received, yesterday, Beatrice Coles, principal of Sedalla public school and chairman of arrangements, reported good response in cash and other donations.

The following reports from schools had been received: Climax, \$8.05; Florence, \$10.71; Gibsonville, \$10.65; Goshen, \$15; East White Oak, \$7.32; Mt. Zion, \$5; Oak Springs, \$2; Oak Ridge, \$2; Jackson, \$8.17; Bass Chapel, \$1.50; Summerfield, \$5; Palmer Memorial Institute, \$10., and Sedalla public school, \$25.84. Girl Reserves of Goshen gave six dozen glasses, East White Oak, 25 glasses and Oak Springs material for dish cloths. About 200 feed bags were turned in for making dish cloths it was stated.
