(2) to re-awaken parents to the importance of guarding t h e health and morals of their families in the face of difficult wartime and postwar conditions, (3) to encourage the establishments of day care centers for the young children of working mothers and after-school supervision of their school-age children. (4) to help counteract juvenile delinquency by promoting better community recreational facilities as well as better family relations for older boys and girls, (5) to lend active support to all efforts in behalf of material and child health, improved nutrition,

Negro Division of Community Teen Age Club War Chest Gces Over Top


