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A. & T. To Present Annual Christmas Concert



Continuing a tradition of many years, the A. and T. College Choral Society, under the direction of Prof. Coleridge A. Braithwaite, will present its annual Christmas concert in the Richard B. Harrison auditorium this Sunday afternoon at 5:30. Following an organ prelude, "O Holy Night," a 19th century French Christmas carol, the audience will join in the Latin hymn, "Adestes Fideles." The first group of selections by the Choral Society will consist of "Behold That Star," "Go Tell It On The Mountains," two Christ-

mas spirituals arranged by the well known composer, William Lawrence, and the "Sanctus," from the St. Cecilia Mass, by Guonod. The male Glee club will then render a trio of familiar carols, "O Little Town of Bethlehem," "Silent Night," and "Joy to the World." Preceding the intermission, the entire society will perform the historical "Hallelujah Chorus" from Handel's Oratorio, "The Messiah." Arcadelt's familiar "Ave Maria" will open the next group which will include also the directors' arrangement of the ancient mel-

ody, "Lo, How a Rose E'er Blooming," and Boughton's joyful "The Holly and the Ivy." The double sextette will be featured in the Bach Chorale, "Break Forth, O Beauteous Heavenly Light," Christiansen's romantic "Lullaby on Christmas Eve," and the stirring "Rockin' Jerusalem" by John Work. "The Miracle of St. Nicholas," an arrangement by Davison, Osgood's gay "Christmas Bells," and the society's own arrangement of "White Christmas" will conclude the program. The organ postlude will be the director's organ

transcription of the Welsh Chorale, "Unto Thee All Praise Be Given."

Soloists for the program will include Misses Jeanette and Connie Bass, '45, Spartanburg, S. C.; Sadie Davis, '47, Asheville. In addition to the soloists, the double sextette includes Misses Mary Dozier, '47, of Salter, S. C.; Rosa Free, '47, Greensboro; Odessa Jeffries, '45, Greensboro; William Diggs, '47, of Rock Hill, S.
