## Red Cross Nurses Aide Class Starts At L. Richardson Hospital

Recruitment has started for women volunteers to enroll as Red Cross Nurses' Aides to serve at L. Richardson hospital, announced Mrs. J. E. Trescher, chairman of Red Cross Nurses' Aides of the Greensboro chapter. Plans for enrolling volunteers for Richardson hospital were mapped on Wednesday when Mrs. Trescher and Mrs. Max T. Payne, chairman of Volunteer Services, met with Nurse Geneva Collins Hunt, superintendent of L. Richardson hospital. The need for Nurses' Aides at this hospital has developed within the past few months and the Board of Directors and staff of the hospital requested the chapter to organize a unit of aides to help ease the nursing situation.

Present plans are for a day class to start within one month to six weeks, depending upon response of women of the community. Classes will be held at L. Richardson hospital and will be taught by an authorized Red Cross Nurses' Aide instructor. The course requires 80 hours of intensive training, 35 of which is classroom, lecture and practice work, and 45 hours of which is supervised practice work in hospital wards.

**Who May Enroll?** — Resolute and dependable women willing to help care for the sick in the civilian hospital in our community. Applicants must be between 18 and 50 years of age; must be an American citizen, have a high school education, or its equivalent; pass a physical examination, plans for which will be announced later. Members of the Red Cross Nurses Aide corps must agree to serve with-

out pay, to be on duty at least 150 hours each year, and to work always under the supervision of graduate nurses.

Mrs. Trescher asked any women who are interested in this corps to register at the Red Cross Chapter House by telephone 3-4481. A regular Nurses Aide Corps application form will be mailed promptly to each applicant, who should complete it and return to the Chapter House. The N. A. committee will review all applications and will select the 20 women to be enrolled.

Another layer to the foundation for the concerted drive to combat venereal diseases in Greensboro, starting June 8, was added Friday as a group of Negro women leaders gathered at ORD to hear and see descriptions of conditions existing in this city.

The Negro women's group met at a post theater at 11:30 a. m. for news briefings, after which they were served luncheon at the service club, and a series of illustrated lectures on venereal diseases brought the meeting to a close.

The general venereal disease committee, headed by W. H. Sullivan as chairman, meeting late Friday, set June 8 as official opening date of the campaign to continue over a long period. The general committee will meet again Monday at 4 p. m. in city council chamber.

On June 12 members of the Greensboro civic clubs will gather at the military post for luncheon as guests of ORD and to see and hear descriptions existing in the city.

Churches in the city are expected to support the drive against venereal infections by emphasizing the moral aspect of venereal prevention.

Various committee chairmen presented their reports Friday and plans were made to add a representative of labor to the general committee. Dr. Ruth Y. Schiffman and Mrs. Homer Coltrane have been added to represent the council of social agencies.

The police stated that Miss McKinney admitted stabbing Horton but denied that she intended killing him. It was stated that the incident followed an argument between Horton and Miss McKinney at the scene of the slaying. It was also stated that Miss McKinney had been to dinner at the home of the deceased before the incident occurred Sunday.
