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## Bennett Trustees Elect Officers

Election of new officers of the board of trustees of Bennett College was completed here recently during the annual meeting of the body. At the same time the board approved a budget of \$266,300 for the school year 1945-'46.

Receiving approval was a post-war expansion program of \$850,000 which is scheduled to begin in the fall with the construction of a new dormitory.

Re-elected as chairman of the board was Dr. W. C. Jackson, chancellor of the Woman's Col-

lege of the University of North Carolina. Vice chairmen are Mrs. W. H. C. Goode, Sidney, O., and Bishop A. P. Shaw, of Baltimore, Md. Mrs. Ida S. Meidenbauer, of Buffalo, N. Y., was named treasurer, succeeding the late Dr. Thomas F. Holgate, of Evanston, Ill., while Mrs. D. H. Hargis, of Wilmington, Del., was named secretary.

Dr. Horace G. Smith, president of Garrett Biblical Institute, Evanston, Ill., replaces Dr. Holgate on the board, while Bishop Robert N. Brooks, of New Orleans, La., is a new member.

## COURTS WIN PRAISE OF VICE SQUAD IN FIGHT AGAINST VD

The co-operation of Judge Adam Younce in municipal-county court in the handling of morals cases was cited by members of the police vice squad over the week-end as the reason for a marked improvement in the situation here, only three arrests on morals charges being reported Saturday night and early Sunday morning.

The detectives declared that stiff sentences handed out by the court to some offenders with bad records has had a telling effect on others engaged in the same nefarious trade. They also cited a case where a girl was given a 30-day sentence in municipal-county court and gave notice of appeal to Superior court. At the conclusion of her trial in that court a few days later, officers said a guilty verdict was rendered and the sentence raised to four months.

This action, they said, along with the cooperation of the lower court, has served to "throw fear into their hearts and the women just aren't around now to

arrest." They declared that the squad was continually on the go Saturday night but with little or no success. They added that the "old familiar faces just aren't there."

The officers were strong in their praise of the work of the courts during the current drive against venereal disease and added that this cooperation will go a long way toward assisting in reducing the high rate of infection in the city.

Arrested Saturday night in the vice roundup were Louise Taylor, Hamtown, on a charge of immoral vagrancy and Norman C. Ralford, 841 Austin street, and Donnie Leveite, 843 Austin street, both on charges of immoral conduct.

The Taylor woman was arrested at Washington and Davie streets, while the other couple were taken into custody at J. C. Price school. The couple posted bond pending trial in municipal-county court July 2, while the Taylor woman was held in default of bond for trial.

## Canning Without Sugar Is Suggested By Agent

To fret over lack of sugar and postpone canning while early fruits go by is just plain foolish, Miss Nell Kennett, county home agent, declared Wednesday.

To can without sugar is both safe and satisfactory, since sugar does not serve as a preservative in canning but only as a flavoring, she said. Housewives may can now and sweeten fruits next winter when they are opened for use, Miss Kennett said.

She stated however, that those having sufficient sugar for canning now should go ahead and sweeten fruits on packing, since less is required in canning than in sweetening at the time of use.

Fruits won't wait, she emphasized, and local people should take advantage of products now appearing to prepare for the shortage of canned fruits which is predicted for coming months.

For those canners who must have syrup, she suggested the use of honey, which may replace as much as one-half of the sugar called for. Corn syrup, if anyone can find it, can replace a third of the sugar needed.

Lucky housewives who have canning sugar right now should stick to thinner syrups, using either two or three cups of water or juice to a cup of sugar. It's best to steer clear of saccharine in

canning, since it is likely to give a bitter flavor, she said.

One should use the same method in canning without sugar as is used with sugar, Miss Kennett stated. She suggested that any canners having difficulties or needing advice on methods, call the Guilford home demonstration office for information.

## HIGH POINT CHILD SCALDED TO DEATH

HIGH POINT, June 28—Gary McDaniels, 11-month-old son of Pfc. Thomas and Edna Staley McDaniels, of High Point, was fatally scalded at noon today.

The child had been placed in a bath tub. As the mother turned her back for a moment, the infant turned the hot water on himself. The child was rushed to a hospital but died soon after arriving.

The child, who was born at Liberty, is survived by his parents; one sister, Leta Mae; one brother, Tommy; his maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Staley, of Randleman, route 2, and his paternal grandfather, Robert McDaniels, Cedar Falls. The father is stationed at Camp Pickett, Va.

Funeral will be held at 2:30 p. m. Saturday at Antioch church, near Seagrove.
